Vale Don Horsley

32070 Donald Douglas HORSLEY 14 January 1929 – 18 February 2021

We are saddened to hear of the passing of Life Member Don Horsley. Don was legendary within the corps of RAEME throughout Australia and was renowned for his skills as a tradesman and his ability to communicate with those around him and later in life, helping veterans and families in need of assistance as a Pensions/Welfare Officer and a trainer within the DVA PIP program.

Don enlisted in the Australia Regular Army on the 25 February 1949 after serving for eight months in the Citizens Military Forces (CMF). He was discharged with the rank of Captain on 29 March 1974.

During his 25 years of full-time service, Don became proficient in the following skills: Fitter, General; Vehicle Mechanic; Artificer (Vehicle); Quartermaster; Trade Testing Officer and Electrical Engineer.

Don served in many postings within Australia throughout his illustrious career, he also saw service overseas in Japan and Korea March 1954 - September 1955; AHQ Antarctic Expedition November 1958 - April 1959; United Kingdom June 1962 - August 1962; Vietnam August 1965 - August 1966.

Don was RAEME through and through and it was said that when he bled it was blue, yellow and red. He was so well respected within the corps that he was commonly referred to as "The Horses Head".

Don was a simple man, laid back, was a bit of a larrikin and had a great sense of humour. He remained that way until his passing.

He remained a true mate to those who knew him right up 'til the end.

113's (2 Med Wksp's) First OC

Lieutenant Colonel Alan Francis Clark McKechnie (WX3425)

LTCOL McKechnie was born on December 31, 1901 in St Peters SA. An Engineer by profession, he joined the militia in 35 Fortress Coy (RAE) on 3 Dec 1938, receiving his Commission as a Lieutenant on 13 Dec of the same year.

At the outbreak of war, he was called up for full time duty and in Mar 1940 he was appointed Engineer Services - HQ Western Command and promoted to Temporary Captain, later that year taking over 66 Light Aid Detachment.

In Nov 1940 he was posted to 2/3rd Machine Gun Battalion, only to be posted again a month later to 2/4th Army Field Workshop.

He left for the Middle East on 25 Sep 1941 and went to the 2/1st Army Field Workshop. Promoted to Major on 15 Jan 1942 he was transferred to the 2nd Advanced Ordnance Workshop and a month later he was appointed Senior Officer Mechanical Engineering (SORE) at HQ AIF (ME) Base Area, only to return to 2 Adv Ord Wksp in May.

With the withdrawal of AIF units back to Australia, Major McKechnie returned to Australia on 29 Jan 1943, where on promotion to Lieutenant Colonel he took up the appointment as CO of 2/4 Tank Workshop Company (WA) later transferring to the 2/2nd Tank Wksp Coy

(NSW) and 2/2nd Base Wksp in Jan 1944. Later that year he appointed Chief Inspector AEME Maintenance Division, M G.O. Branch. A posting to the staff of DMGO (M) LHQ -NSW on in Nov 1944 led to two inspection tours of New Guinea in Dec/Jan and May/Jul 1945.

Following the end of the War, LTCOL McKechnie was transferred to the Reserve Service List (retired) in Jul 1945. With the formation of the CMF, he was appointed EME (Major) CMF on 1 Apr 1948 and in Sep 1948, was made CO Western Command RAEME Training Depot and OC 2 Medium Workshop. His final retirement occurred on 4Jul 1952 when he transferred to the Reserve of officers (RAEME) 5 MD

???Did You Know???

We are currently working with the Heritage Committee of Engineers Australia and the Army History Unit about getting National Engineering Heritage recognition of the collection at the Army Museum.

The collection, while reflecting the history of the Australian Army in a Western Australia context, includes many items of military technology developed by Australian engineers and is one of the most complete and well documented collections of its type.

Amongst its exhibits are

- Examples of all Australian small arms from colonial times to the present day which traces the development of firearms from flint locks to percussion caps, lever action, bolt action and semi-automatic rifles including all those produced by the Lithgow Armaments factory.
- Examples of the 2 pounder and 25 pounder guns produced Examples of the 2 pounder and 25 pounder guns produced under licence by GMH.
- One of only 50 Universal (Bren Gun) Carriers built at the Midland Railway workshop in WA.
- The Australian designed and built Wiles mobile cooker which provided a mobile field steam cooking facility through both World Wars.
- The Australian designed and built gun stabilisation systems for the Centurion and later Leopard Tank.
- The Australian designed and built modification of the American M113 to accept the British Scorpion turret in the Fire Support vehicle.
- The Australian designed and built Light Wrecker using a Holmes recovery rig on an International Harvester chassis.
- The Australian designed and built modification of the British Landover Series 2 to accept the American 106mm Recoilless rifle.
- The West Australian designed and built modifications to the Mercedes Unimog to become an SAS “mothership”.
- The Australian Perentie Project which made several modifications to the British Landover 110, including an entirely different engine.
- The Australian designed and built Landover Defender based 6x6 Long Range Patrol Vehicle (LRPV).
